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

How Did Your Kriegy Stay Involved While At Oflag 64?

We've learned over the years that our Kriegies kept themselves busy in various ways. Some arrived at the camp in already established professions, others developed new skills and became proficient at "new professions" while in captivity.

According to the March 2, 1944 Oflag 64 ITEM, of the 300 or so men who resided at the camp at that time, there were 7 doctors, 12 engineers, 7 lawyers, 5 chemists, 5 newspapermen, and 9 professors. Of the other men there, some had quite unusual professions such as professional fund raiser, fingerprint classifier, broker, Commandant of Cadets, jeweler, cotton merchant, golf pro, winter sports instructor, YMCA secretary, oil rig builder, and fire insurance inspector. Additional fields represented included: 7 business managers, 3 machinists, 11 accountants, 2 aircraftsmen, an instrument maker, a pay master, 3 steel workers, a statistician, 3 railroad men, a restaurant operator, and two petroleum engineers. About a quarter of the men were listed as students, clerks, salesmen and farmers.

Over the months that followed, hundreds more men arrived at the camp, each with his separate skill or profession. We would like to know what your Kriegy did while in captivity and if he continued in his present or "new profession" following the war. Please contact us at the email addresses below.








Wikipedia Pages



The Tin Store

As you are undoubtedly aware, efforts have been underway for quite some time to establish a POW museum in Szubin Poland at the site of the former Oflag 64 prison camp. Over the last year or so, much has been accomplished to make that happen. The newly created museum, called the <u>Tin Store</u>, is housed in one of the original buildings at the camp, formerly called the Tin Store, interestingly enough. Information and photos below, including design photos, have been taken from the website of the Polish-American Foundation for the Commemoration of POW Camps in Szubin. Place

In 2022, the Foundation renovated an original camp building, the POW Tin Store. The POWs had used this modest building to stockpile and ration a portion of the lifesaving food tins that came in their Red Cross parcels. Today, the renovated Tin Store will provide a premier exhibit space for small exhibits and events.

The three-month renovation project--led by the Foundation, with support from the town of Szubin and the school on whose grounds the building is located--was made possible by generous donations to the U.S. Friends of Oflag 64. Improvements included structural repairs, new HVAC and security systems, lighting, a new bathroom, and a new tile floor. The approximately 600 square-foot space will store and exhibit our artifacts in a secure and comfortable venue.

One day we hope to also renovate the last remaining brick barracks in Szubin. For now, however, the combination of our current exhibit space and our artifacts collection will make the POW Tin Store Museum a unique destination. The Tin Store is a gem. The high quality of the building renovation, its furnishings, and the exhibit space create a perfect first step in commemorating the history of the POW camps of Szubin.

Exhibition

The permanent exhibition will follow a chronological and thematic layout. It will begin with Szubin and the surrounding territories, focusing on the outbreak of World War II, and the German occupation of the area. The exhibits will introduce the establishment and development of the German POW camp network in the Polish lands which were incorporated into the Reich.

The middle (and largest) part of the exhibition will be devoted to the Szubin camps and the imprisonment of those held there. It will be divided into thematic sections related to nearly all aspects of life, work, and death behind the barbed wire.

The final part of the exhibition will deal with the final months of World War II, the post-war memory of the camps, as well as the activities of the individuals and associations responsible for establishing the Museum.











MIS-X: The U.S. Escape and Evasion Experts


What do you know about the MIS-X project? On the website of The National Museum of the United States Air Force, the following explanation is given: https://www.nationalmuseum.af.mil/Visit/Museum-Exhibits/Fact-Sheets/Display/Article/197474/mis-x-the-us-escape-and-evasion-experts/

"Modeled on the British escape branch M.I.9, the top-secret MIS-X (Military Intelligence Service-X) organization gave U.S. service personnel formal training and special tools for escape and evasion. Their efforts helped those airmen who were evading and those who had become POWs.

MIS-X craftsmen modified common items found in POW aid packages to conceal hidden maps, radios, saws, compasses, and money, among other things. MIS-X also employed the help of several companies, which inserted material as part of the manufacturing process. To avoid compromising genuine aid societies, MIS-X sent these items to POWs in parcels shipped under the cover of fictitious aid organizations.

MIS-X aided several of the 737 U.S. military members who successfully escaped from German POW camps during WWII. Perhaps more importantly, MIS-X maintained contact with U.S. POWs at 64 German camps, both giving and receiving useful and timely information from the so-called "barbed wire front."

At the end of the war, the War Department disbanded MIS-X and most of the material related to this highly secret organization was destroyed."

At Oflag 64, this project was fully operational. In addition to escape aids, codes were devised, code writers and readers assigned and trained, and a system of secret communication was put in place.


We are currently aware of a number of Oflag 64 Kriegies who participated in this project, and we learn of more on a regular basis. Various code letters have been found and have been decoded by experts. The Oflag 64 Kriegy Research Group (KRG) is in possession of some of them and is working to learn more from them as more are being decoded.

POW Camps Our Kriegies May Have Stayed At or Passed Through

Stalag VIIA in Moosburg has several German local historians trying to preserve history. I [David Little] think the use of signage has helped tell the story.





The videos [and photos] of the last remaining original barracks are interesting. It happened to be a transit officer barracks, so any of our men who transited thru this camp on to Oflag 64 likely were in and around this barracks.





Stalag IIIA in Luckenwalde is forested now. Only the main road paths remain. The city was basically left intact, and some of our men at this camp likely visited the town after liberation. Some US Army trucks circulated in the town and area as well picking up Americans on 6 May 1945.







The Hildesheim airfield was massive. A glider and paratrooper training ground as well as Luftwaffe use. The pictures do not do it justice. Clear that many transport planes could land here to deliver supplies and evacuate our men and wounded to France. The men from Luckenwalde who were healthier came here from Barby bridgehead. The men who were sicker went to the airfield near Magdeburg instead.

The Barby town on the Elbe river was the site of the Truman pontoon bridge the US Army threw across. This is still a ferry crossing location.



Carlene Levín 1928 ~ 2023



Carlene Levin, loving wife of Robert Edward Levin and devoted mother, died on Oct. 18 in Southern Pines, NC. She was 95.

Gloria Carlene Hardy was born on Feb. 28, 1928, in Danville, VA. It was there that she met her husband-to-be on a blind date. They were married on Oct. 22, 1948, at her home. Her death came days short of their 75th wedding anniversary.

Carlene Levin was the quintessential Southern girl who went north, leaving Virginia in 1954 for Massapequa, NY. For the sake of her family, she learned to ice skate, sled, and drive in the snow. The move also produced her distinctive speaking voice, a Southern drawl with a Long Island accent!

Among her passions were gardening, traveling, and cooking (even for picky children!). She was always well-dressed, never giving in to the tracksuit styles of advanced age. She valued her vast collection of shoes, even if there was no room in the closet for her husband.

She was the mother of two - daughter Linda Kaye (married to Neal Vitale) and son Robert Edward Jr. (Diane Fournier Levin). She could be a worrier when it came to the kids (and grandkids), but she always wanted the best for them, even when it meant confronting her own fears or insecurities. She was a role model of kindness, caring, and support.

Carlene Levin was a petite lifelong redhead. Though considered sweet by her friends and caregivers, her family remembers when her temper occasionally matched the color of her hair. Card playing, another long-term favorite pastime - especially bridge - could often be where this behavior was manifest. (Bob, why did you bid that? You should have led a spade!)

She also enjoyed her philanthropic activities and was always willing to help a friend in need. She was an active member of the P.E.O. Sisterhood, an organization that supports educational opportunities for women worldwide. After moving back to the South, to North Carolina in 1985, she volunteered at Sandhills/Moore Coalition for Human Care.

Mrs. Levin is survived by her husband, [Kriegy Robert E. Levin, Sr.] her children, and their families - three grandchildren and seven greatgrandchildren.

A Celebration of Life was held at 11am on Thursday, Jan. 11, 2024, at the Belle Meade Chapel, 100 Waters Drive, Southern Pines.

Services were entrusted to Boles Funeral Home of Southern Pines.
