





Tells of Escape From Nazi Prison, Grilling; 361 Mile Forced March Across Poland

Back from the irksome ordeals means to force answers from me. of nearly four months as a Ger- BOX CAR JOURNEY. man prisoner of war, Maj. Robert Christensen is home today with stories of a 361 mile forced march in sub-zero weather across Po-

land; his escape, from a Nazi pris-on camp and going into hiding until being rescued by American forces; being subjected to eight days of solitary confinement and grilling by Ger-man officers and other encounters with the enemy

in Europe The officer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Christensen, 1935 North North Carl Howell street, and husband of Mrs. Jean Christensen, a nurse at the University hospital in Iowa City, is spending a brief leave in Dav-enport enroute to Schick General He expects an hospital, Clinton. hospital, Clinton. He expects an extended leave in the near future. Maj. Christensen was held for some time at Oflag 64 in Poland with Lieut. Richard Englehart and Lieut. Arthur Detmers, Davenport, who were on the march from the camp into Germany and who also succeeded in escaping TAKEN IN HURTGEN. n

Attached to Hodge's First army, Maj. Christensen was taken prisoner Nov. 7 in the Hurtgen forest of Germany. "It was a good size bunch of Americans 'Jerry' took that day," the officer remarked, "and following our capture we were shifted around the front to several collecting points before assignment to a regular prison.

"Taken to a camp near Limburg, the Nazis, presuming I would have access to military information which would be of benefit to them, threw me into a solitary confinement with hopes of probably softening me up for questioning.

"The cell, a 'two by four' dank room with a large iron door and a small window that admitted little light, was my home for eight days while in solitary. The only furniture in the cell was a bed. Occasionally German officers would grill me in an attempt to make me divulge American positions and other information. They were They were

"On Jan. 21. the entire Oflag ton camp was forced to evacuate and to p head for Germany in the wake of the advancing Russians. Many esalso caped, but I completed the forced march of 361 miles to Hammel-85 8 tive scho burg, Germany, in temperatures which went as low as 30 degrees Islan below zero.

Maj. Christensen was reported on Dec. 9 as having been missing in action since Nov. 4. Later it was announced he was a prisoner of war. He had been attached to a headquarters company of an infantry division of the First army.

The message to his wife stated that he was now back with the American forces and was well and safe.



George Ann Brown Carter Bahan

Fort Worth, Texas - George Ann Brown Carter Bahan died peacefully at home on Wednesday, September 7, surrounded by her family. She was 95.

The service [was] live streamed at FUMCFW.org/live. She [was] laid to rest privately on the family plot in Greenwood Memorial Park.

Born in Okmulgee, Oklahoma, George Ann was the only child of George and Eulema Riley Brown. The family eventually made their way to Fort Worth via Kilgore.

George Ann graduated from R. L. Pascal High School in 1943. After graduation she attended Mary Baldwin College in Virginia for 1 year before transferring to the University of Texas in Austin, and graduating in 1948. She joined the Tri Delta Sorority and many years later was thrilled to pin her granddaughter, Carter Ann, when she joined. George Ann was a Steeplechase debutante in 1948.

After returning to Fort Worth, George Ann met the love of her life and future husband, [the late Kriegy] <u>Amon Carter Jr.</u> at a party. Amon always said he was attracted to her cute hat and had to meet the pretty girl wearing it. George Ann always loved hats after that. They married in 1953 and remained happily together until his untimely death in 1982. She and Amon had three children, Nenetta Carter Tatum, Amon G. Carter III and George Riley Carter.

Family was everything to George Ann and she was devoted to them, especially her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She loved having them drop by to swim and the food of choice always was Kincaids hamburgers.

George Ann was a talented, and perhaps frustrated, performer who got her dream fulfilled

when she performed in several musicals at the Granbury Opera House. Amon was extremely

proud of her and would hire buses to take their friends to see her. She worked extremely hard on her dancing and singing since she never wanted to let the other performers down. The comraderie with the younger and talented performers was very rewarding to her. They even took lessons from her on how to apply stage makeup.

George Ann was also very involved in her community. She was a past president of Casa Manana, the Jewel Charity Ball, the Junior League of Fort Worth and the Assembly. In addition, she was a founding member of Fort Worth Country Day school. She enjoyed serving on the symphony Board and was thrilled to receive an Honorary Doctorate from Texas Wesleyan University. George Ann also loved being with friends and belonged to a water ski group for many years as well as her Tuesday poker group. These women would have done well in Las Vegas and were very serious players. They only stopped playing five years ago.

The second chapter of her life came in 2001 when she married Bill Bahan, also a widower. They used to drive carpool together way back in the '60's and lived down the street from each other. Bill had five children and she enjoyed having this new extended family. They were happily married until his death in 2020. They built a home together and had a small pool where her two great-grandsons loved to come swim and make her nervous by always jumping off a wall which they of course continued doing. Eventually her great-granddaughter started coming and these were always special times for her.

Fort Worth has lost a great patron and citizen. George Ann loved Fort Worth and was proud to carry on the tradition of charity and community support. She leaves an aching hole in many peoples' hearts, but her spirit and zest for life will remain.

She was preceded in death by her parents, George and Eulema Riley Brown, her husbands, Amon Carter and Bill Bahan, and her son, George Riley Carter. In addition to her daughter, Nenetta Carter Tatum and her husband, Steve, George Ann is survived by her son, Amon G. Carter III; grandchildren, Carter Ann Tatum and her husband, Van Wilson of Austin, Stephen Lyle Tatum Jr. and his wife, Carly of Fort Worth, and Amon G. Carter IV "Chance" also of Fort Worth; great-grandchildren, Samuel Carter Tatum and Colin Douglas Tatum of Fort Worth, Lyla Marie Wilson of Austin, and Clover Ann Carter also of Fort Worth.

Monica Stewart Bishara, 74, of Baton Rouge, passed away on August 10, 2023.

Monica was born in San Antonio, Texas to Mary Louise and [to the late Kriegy] <u>Lt.</u> <u>Colonel Donald Stewart</u>. She

was the first of five children. While Monica considered San Antonio to be her hometown, her family also lived in France, Germany, Oklahoma, and New York due to her father's military career.

Monica was an extraordinary and gifted artist, even from a young age. Her parents recognized her talents and started her art lessons when she was a little girl while they were living in France. She continued to develop her talents and grow her skills throughout her entire life.

Monica graduated from Our Lady of the Lake University in 1972 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in French and Art. She then earned a Master of Arts degree in French from Tulane University in 1974. That is where she met the love of her life, James "Jim" Johannes Bishara. She quickly decided that she was going to marry Jim and eventually he figured it out as well. They married in 1975 and settled down in Metairie, LA where they had and raised two children, James and Elizabeth. Monica retired after teaching art for 20 years at Ursuline Academy in New Orleans. She and Jim moved to Baton Rouge where she worked out of her studio. She was a signature member of the Louisiana Watercolor Society and served as their president. Monica also served on the boards of the Baton Rouge Art League, the Associated Women in the Arts and the National League of American Pen Women, and she volunteered with Operation Mainstream to teach reading to adults.

Monica was drawn to luminous, transparent colors which were perfect for describing the warm southern light of her Louisiana home. Her award-winning paintings hang in many private and corporate collections. Most recently, her watercolor "Peace, Love and Roses" won the Purchase Award at the Baton Rouge Art League Annual Exhibition in April and will be part of their permanent collection of Louisiana artists at the LA State Archives.

Monica was preceded in death by her father, Lt. Colonel Donald Stewart.

Monica is survived by Jim, her husband of 48 years; her son, James Andrew Bishara and his wife Dana Bishara; her daughter, Elizabeth Bishara Windust and her husband Phil Windust; brothers, Robert Donald Stewart and David Anthony Stewart; sisters, Kathleen Stewart Herrera and Barbara Stewart; mother, Mary Louise Stewart; and grandchildren, Marisol Bishara, Cosette Bishara, Connor Windust, and Sebastian Windust.
